**A**s the only hospital in Ontario solely dedicated to specialized rehabilitation, St. John's Rehab is setting the bar for innovative care. We are recognized as a benchmark rehabilitation leader by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and the Ontario Hospital Association.

We are home to Ontario's only dedicated burn and Canada's only organ transplant rehabilitation programs. We provide specialized rehabilitation for amputations, cancer, cardiac surgery, stroke, neurological conditions, traumatic injuries and orthopaedic conditions. We also offer health clinics such as acupuncture, massage therapy, chiropractic and chiropody to the community.

Working in partnership with patients, other health providers, funders and supporters, St. John's Rehab Hospital is rebuilding people's lives.

# A FEW LINES FROM OUR CHAIR & PRESIDENT

**W**ith a renewed corporate vision, St. John's Rehab Hospital moved into 2005-06 with an ambitious objective – to be recognized as a leader in specialized rehabilitation care. Throughout the year, we made major strides – laying the groundwork to strengthen and leverage what makes us a provincial leader.

The year opened with a goal to renew the organization's strategic mandate. A new five-year strategic plan, approved in September 2005, is already coming to life. We are advancing patient-centred rehabilitation care through clinical best-practice, enhanced support for our expert team, teaching leadership, model corporate stewardship and new ventures in rehabilitation research.

In July 2005, the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and the Ontario Hospital Association named St. John's Rehab a benchmark hospital for rehabilitation – signalling others could learn by our standard of care. We added yet another groundbreaking rehabilitation program for cancer patients. Major progress was achieved in a provincial initiative to improve care for total joint

replacements. Our innovative information management partnership is developing systems that will both improve patient care and reduce costs throughout the health care system.

As the year drew to a close, we learned that the Ontario government had approved our capital redevelopment project – one of our most important strategic milestones. The Board of Directors and the entire hospital community have worked diligently to make a future-focused rehabilitation facility a reality for better patient outcomes and increased patient access to specialized rehabilitation.

As you browse through this annual report, you'll see many other achievements that exhibit a remarkable level of ambition, creativity, commitment and expertise on the part of our staff, physicians, sisters and volunteers. Every day, our teams show extraordinary resolve to rebuild our patients' lives. The Board of Directors takes great pride in all that the hospital community has accomplished this year.

# READING BETWEEN THE LINES

APRIL 2005 > New model of care for total joint replacement implemented, allowing most patients to get back on their feet and home safely in as few as ten days after surgery.

MAY 2005 > Expert burn rehabilitation clinicians present and demonstrate treatment model to Québec City health professionals that will use St. John's – home to the only specialized burn rehabilitation program in Canada – as a model for a new burn program.

JUNE 2005 > *Step Ahead Rehab*, fee-for-service orthopaedic clinic for patients and the community opens.

Hospital begins seven-day-per-week admissions, allowing patients to receive rehabilitation sooner while freeing up acute care beds.

JULY 2005 > In their 2005 Hospital Report Series, the Ontario Hospital Association and the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care recognize St. John's Rehab as a benchmark rehabilitation leader.

SEPTEMBER 2005 > Hospital reaches out to Toronto-area's Cantonese-speaking residents with free health forum on living with arthritis.

Disability Management Centre begins offering private and public sector services.

NOVEMBER 2005 > Pilot project developed with Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre for specialized cancer rehabilitation.

Cardiac partnership created to develop a smooth transition from inpatient care at St. John's Rehab to outpatient care at Toronto Rehab Institute.

MARCH 2006 > Ontario government notifies hospital that it has approved our capital redevelopment and expansion project.

St. John's Rehab Auxiliary donates \$100,000 to *Rebuilding Lives* Campaign.

■ **May 2005**

More than 250 patients, orthopaedic surgeons and health professionals attend the Toronto *Hip Hip Hooray!* event in support of the Canadian Orthopaedic Foundation at St. John's Rehab, raising more than \$200,000 for orthopaedic health and research.

First meeting of the Community Advisory Committee, a Board of Directors' forum for community partners to share information and provide advice about the hospital's services.

Total Joint Network conference at St. John's Rehab involves 22 hospitals and community care access centres. The network's goal is to improve patient care and access for joint replacement surgeries in the Greater Toronto Area.

150 patients attend the 2nd Annual Alumni Reunion.

Margery Warren Terrace Garden opens, providing a natural sanctuary for patients through a \$300,000 estate gift.

Henan University officials from China meet to discuss potential Traditional Chinese Medicine partnership.

8th Annual Rehab Golf Classic raises more than \$71,000.

New lifts and accessibility equipment installed throughout the hospital to ensure maximum patient comfort and dignity.

■ **September 2005**

St. John's Rehab kicks off process for 2006 accreditation by the Canadian Council on Health Services Accreditation.

# REDRAWING THE LINES IN PATIENT CARE

## ONCOLOGY REHABILITATION PROGRAM

**S**t. John's Rehab has explored a new frontier for specialized rehabilitation: treatment to maximize recovery of cancer survivors. In partnership with Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, this program is rebuilding the lives of people who have undergone surgery for major organ cancers.

The active, short-stay program – one of only a few of its kind in Ontario – treated 19 patients with highly complex needs during the six-month pilot phase. The project means cancer survivors can return home with independence, hope and motivation to move on with their lives.


The exciting niche program means better patient outcomes and shorter wait times for cancer care in Ontario. Our acute care partners such as Sunnybrook will be able to focus on saving lives, while St. John's Rehab provides expert care to maximize quality of life and allow a smooth transition home.

## SEVEN-DAY JOINT REPLACEMENT REHAB

A new model of care at St. John's Rehab means many patients who undergo joint replacement surgery are up and walking enough to return home after seven days of rehabilitation. In most cases, patients come to St. John's Rehab three days after surgery and work with an expert multidisciplinary team to regain function and mobility. The streamlined model frees up acute care beds, reducing subsequent wait times for surgery. Most importantly, patients are able to return to active, healthy lives sooner.

## STEP AHEAD REHAB CLINIC

Seeing a growing need in the community for treatment of orthopaedic and traumatic injuries, St. John's Rehab developed the innovative fee-for-service *Step Ahead Rehab Clinic*. This multidisciplinary outpatient clinic lets the community access expert professionals in the unique setting of an accredited rehab hospital.



INTEGRATION OF EASTERN  
AND WESTERN MEDICINE

St. John's Rehab hosted delegates from Chinese universities in June 2005. Henan University of Traditional Chinese Medicine President Peng Bo and Shanghai University Professor Zhang Li Xia made the visit as an effort to collaborate in the promotion of an integrated model of Traditional Chinese Medicine and specialized rehabilitation. They chose St. John's Rehab because we are among the few hospitals in Canada that integrates complementary health services with accredited hospital programs.

**RECIPIENT:** Barb Daly

**ACHIEVEMENT:** Leading staff through the challenges of implementing new oncology program

This new program presented a number of challenges, including a short implementation time frame, significant staff educational needs, and the staff's own emotions while responding to cancer. The implementation's success resulted from the tremendous dedication and perseverance of the team on Patient Care Unit A3.

Team Coordinator Barb Daly led the charge to facilitate education sessions and establish a positive and productive relationship with Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, our acute care partner for the program. Barb engaged the team to not only accept, but also embrace the concept of cancer rehab. With Barb's support, leadership, communication, and commitment to caring, staff have met the challenges head-on. Instead of fear, there is excitement and belief that we can make a difference in rebuilding people's lives following cancer.

**RECIPIENT:** Terrence Yuen

**ACHIEVEMENT:** Wheelchair safety research

Occupational Therapist Terrence Yuen provided a tremendous individual effort to research and recommend safe and appropriate wheelchairs for the trauma, burn, and complex care rehab programs to address patient safety. Terrence's research involved carefully selected criteria, extensive consultation and education, and a comprehensive summary of his work. He spent a significant amount of his own time and effort to complete this research, while incorporating feedback from staff in management, occupational therapy, risk management, environmental services as well as external suppliers. Terrence's excellent work has enabled the hospital to make well-informed decisions about the purchase, use, and maintenance of wheelchairs to ensure effective and safe care.

**ACHIEVEMENT:** Step Ahead Rehab Clinic planning and implementation

The launch of the *Step Ahead Rehab Clinic* came after several months of research and planning by this dedicated team. The implementation required careful management of personnel and material resources to ensure the clinic was a success, while working with staff to manage the cultural shift involved in adding a fee-for-service clinic to our Ambulatory Care program. Since opening its doors in June 2005, *Step Ahead* has brought in approximately \$50,000 in non-government revenue.



# ON THE FRONT LINES OF DISCOVERY

## DEVELOPING ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITY

**H**ealth care leadership is not only about great care today; it's also about striking out into new territory to develop great care for tomorrow. In 2005-2006, St. John's Rehab actively sought research partners to advance rehabilitation science and to study successful patient recovery.

A key partnership was developed with the University of Toronto Department of Rehabilitation Sciences and the Toronto Rehab Institute. A first focus for this partnership will be on tools for effective measurement of patient outcomes. Another newly created key partnership with York University will focus on exploring the social, psychological and biomedical aspects of rehabilitation.

## THIS YEAR'S INNOVATIVE RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS INCLUDE:

- Integrated model of care for joint replacements
- Patient perspectives on inpatient rehabilitation
- Perspectives on transition home following inpatient rehabilitation

- Aerobics and cardio-respiratory fitness after burn injuries
- Psychosocial impacts of upper extremity amputation due to work injury
- Stroke and cognition assessment database

## TEACHING TOMORROW'S HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

Demonstrating true rehabilitation leadership, St. John's Rehab plays a key role in training future clinical and administrative health professionals from across Canada. We offer supervised placements and learning opportunities in professions

including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, nursing, social work, psychology, massage therapy, chiropractic, quality and risk management, public relations, hospital administration and human resources.

This year, St. John's Rehab welcomed students from the University of Toronto, York University, Ryerson University, Humber College, Seneca College, Centennial College, University of New Brunswick, the Michener Institute, Elmcrest College and the Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College.



# AN EYELINE TO THE FUTURE

## TOWARDS A SECURE, EFFECTIVE INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

**I**mproved access to health information using technology means better, more efficient patient services at a reduced cost. Understanding this opportunity, St. John's Rehab is part of Shared Information Management Services (SIMS) – an innovative partnership with six other health-care organizations.

This year, St. John's embarked on a five-year strategic plan for information and technology management. The plan seeks to integrate information sharing, removing gaps between the many stakeholders in health care: physicians, laboratories, community services, home care providers, pharmacies, acute care, long-term care, rehabilitation, and most importantly the patient. Integrating shared technology and coordinating care will improve the health of patients at St. John's Rehab and at all partner providers.

Exciting projects on the horizon are electronic referrals and patient records, better hospital performance monitoring and enhanced web resources for patients and families.



## LOOKING TOWARDS TOMORROW, A LEADING-EDGE TREATMENT FACILITY

As the year drew to a close, the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care announced its future investment in and approval of the hospital's major capital redevelopment project.

A new 50,000-square-foot ambulatory care wing will provide specialized treatment space, clinic areas, and a state-of-the-art whirlpool and therapy pool. Floor-to-ceiling windows will overlook a

new therapy garden with the latest accessibility features anchoring the new main hospital entrance. Our current inpatient wing will be renovated to maximize space for treatment and reallocate 160 beds on five floors instead of four. This much needed redevelopment will bring our facility in line with our vision of being at the forefront of specialized rehabilitation care.

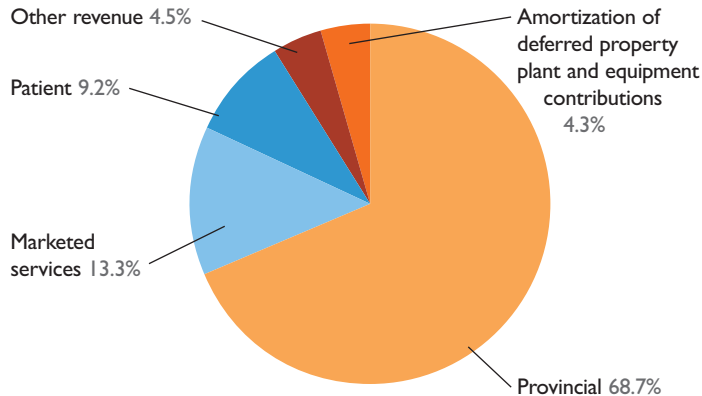

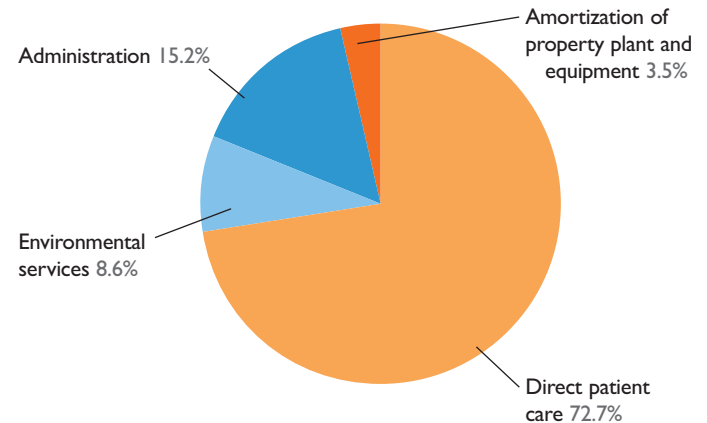
## FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE 2005-2006

### EXPENSES



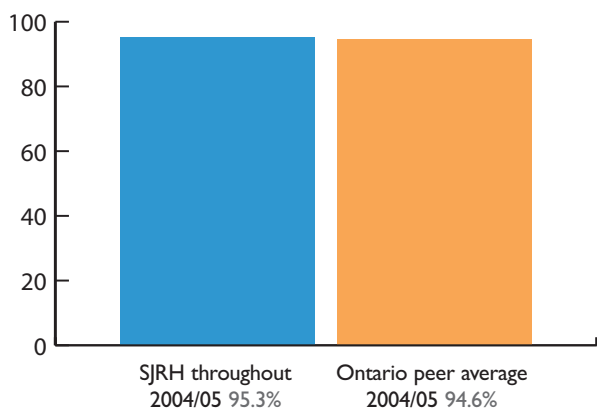
## ACCOUNTABILITY AGREEMENT

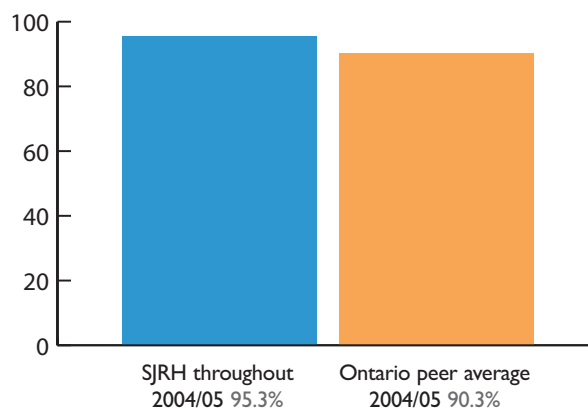

### SATISFACTION WITH OVERALL QUALITY OF CARE

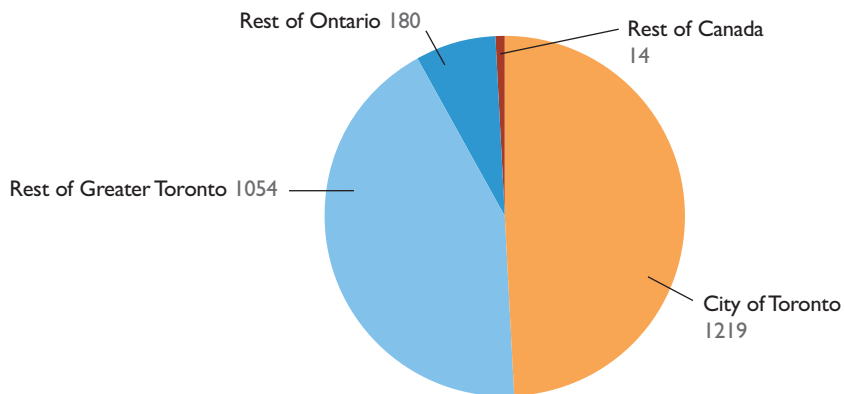


### PATIENTS WHO WOULD RECOMMEND HOSPITAL TO FRIENDS & FAMILY

**I**n 2005, St. John's Rehab approved an ambitious five-year plan to strategically position the hospital as the premier provider of highly specialized rehabilitation services for Ontario.
